Course Description

This course will cover topics related to American government and politics. Students will learn about the foundations of American government, the structure of American institutional arrangements, and the influence of these structures and the political behavior of citizens on electoral and policy outcomes. LSU graduates will demonstrate an understanding of the informing factors of global interdependence, including economic forces, political dynamics, and cultural and linguistic difference.
