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What are crawfish?

- Crawfish are crustaceans. Other organisms found in the family crustacea include shrimp, lobsters, crabs, barnacles, krill, and woodlice (roly polies).
- Crustaceans have an outer shell or exoskeleton made of calcium and a protein, chitin, pronounced "kie-ten."
- They have segmented bodies and are good swimmers. Most crustaceans are aquatic, living in freshwater or marine ecosystems.
- Crawfish are fondly known in Louisiana as "mudbugs" and "crawdads," while in other states "crayfish" is the name given to our "beloved boiler."
- Louisiana produces more than 90% of the crawfish consumed in the United States, and crawfish farming is a major food industry in Louisiana.
- Louisianians consume 70% of the crawfish.

Where do they live?

- Sometimes you can spot a crawfish mound.
- The mound or chimney is formed as a crawfish digs in the ground.
- The holes can be 3 feet deep or greater. Inside these holes or burrows is where the crawfish will rest and spend most of its time.
- The burrows are a source of water for the crawfish. Follow these links to learn more about crawfish.
